Maria Alejandra's Story

as told to Janette Allen

I was born in Oxapampa, a city located in the jungle of Peru. Due to my parents' divorce and economic struggles, I spent a significant portion of my childhood with my loving, God-fearing grandparents. However, I sometimes questioned if God truly existed and if he cared about me. Despite feeling angry and resentful, I held onto hope and faith that a better tomorrow was possible.

My life changed when I moved to Lima to live with my father and enrolled in the only Adventist university in Peru to study environmental engineering. As I delved deeper into my studies, I began reading the Bible and gradually came to know God as a friend, despite feeling unworthy. In my second year of college, I made the decision to be baptized.

I volunteered in the Geoscience Center on campus, where I learned about the creation story and acknowledged God as the Creator. One day, the Director told me about a grant to participate in a DinoDig, an archeological dig in Wyoming. Although I was nervous because I couldn't speak or write basic English, the Director encouraged me to step out in faith and to apply for the grant. To my surprise, I was chosen and received a tourist visa and an airline ticket.

My experience in Wyoming was wonderful. With Spanish-speaking friends at the Dig, I did not need to learn English. I wouldn't need it again anyway, I thought. I would never leave my beloved Peru. Unfortunately COVID devastated my family and my financial resources dwindled. But some of the scientists I met in 2019 offered to help me apply for a scholarship to pursue a Master's degree in geology at Loma Linda University. Despite facing obstacles like acquiring the correct documents, taking exams and caring for relatives with COVID, I decided to trust in God's plan. (continued on page 6)

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





Scholarship Fund Naming

In 1987 Georgia Hodgkin, then President of the National Auxiliary, proposed that as part of their philanthropic mission the Auxiliary could grant tuition scholarships to medical students. She and Dixie Watkins, the 1988-1989 President of the National Auxiliary, met with LLUSM Dean Lyn Behrens who supported their proposal which was then approved by the Auxiliary Board of Directors in 1988. Georgia began a campaign to raise monies for an endowed scholarship fund from the School of Medicine Classes of 1964 and 1965 to honor those classes' Silver Anniversaries. She recruited her three children to stuff envelopes for mailings. The first scholarships were awarded for the school year 1988-89.

This scholarship endowment has now grown large enough to fund a \$10,000 award annually from the account's interest. Dozens of worthy medical students have been the recipients since 1988. With the recent passing of Georgia's son Steven SM '90, husband of past Auxiliary President Sheila (Atiga) Hodgkin, the Auxiliary Board voted to re-name the Scholarship Fund the Steve E Hodgkin Foundation Fund to honor both Georgia and Sheila's amazing support of the Medical Auxiliary over the years.

At first I was unsuccessful in obtaining a visa to the US. I prayed for guidance and decided to do mission work instead of pursuing the scholarship. I found a youth camp that needed volunteers. The camp started in two days, I had two days travel time. I threw some clothes into a backpack and headed to the camp. Upon arrival, I checked my email and saw that the US embassy had granted me an appointment for the next day at 2 pm. After letting the camp organizer know, I immediately traveled back to Lima. Other interviewees told me they had waited months for an interview. But soon the officer gave me the visa approval. I was told it would take three months to process, but 10 days later with visa in hand, I traveled to the airport to start an incredible journey to Loma Linda University.

I had nothing when I arrived, but after meeting Janette Allen at church, she told me about the Little White House. It was such a blessing to get things for my dorm room before winter. These included a comforter, pillows, plates, forks, spoons, blender and containers, as well as plants and food. Since then I have had my share of ups and downs. My dear grandparents passed away and I was heartbroken. However, I love my studies, and I continue to walk in faith and trust that God has a plan for my life. I am grateful to all those who make my stay at Loma Linda University possible, from the anonymous scholarship donors, to professors, classmates, friends, church members and the community. Everywhere I look, I see God's countless blessings.
